Chrism Mass - 12th April - last few days to book!

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

'I invite you now to dedicate yourselves afresh to his service, as stewards of the mysteries of God and ministers of his grace.'

Our Chrism Mass this year will take place, once again, on the Tuesday of Holy Week, 12th April, at Newport Cathedral, at 11am. It is an extraordinarily beautiful service at which the sacred oils are blessed – the oil of the sick, the oil of the catechumens and the holy chrism oil – and ministers of Word and Sacrament together with the people of God, gather together around the Lord's Table to reaffirm our commitment to the ministries entrusted to us.

I warmly encourage all priests, deacons and licensed lay ministers to attend. There will be an opportunity to renew our vows and promises as we walk with Jesus in this holiest of weeks. You are invited to robe – priests and deacons in alb and white stole, LLMs in cassock, surplice and scarf – and to stay on after the service for a buffet lunch.

Congregation members are also warmly invited to come for the service and for the buffet lunch as the Church, once again, recalls the salvation wrought for us in Jesus's self-offering on the cross. This is a moment in Holy Week when each of us can pause and reaffirm our commitment to take up our own cross and follow him.

Social Responsibility Fund

As a diocese we are currently working on developing a vision for our future.

One of the key themes of this vision is the need to be more involved in tackling social injustice - supporting and growing our churches' initiatives to be more outwardly socially responsible.

The horrific scenes in Ukraine have prompted us to expediate our plans in this area and we are now launching a new fund to support these initiatives earlier than expected. We are asking for donations from across the dioceses to grow this fund.

Bishop Cherry, explains: "We hope that people will contribute to this fund as it will help our churches support those most in need, when they need it most."

"Initially, the funds will be used to help the thousands of refugees from Ukraine who are arriving in Wales seeking sanctuary from the horrific violence and devastation being wreaked on that country. However, it will also be available to support the work being done by our churches in welcoming refugees from all over the world, as well as developing projects which tackle the causes of Injustice which lead to huge discrepancies in life expectancy, health, education and Income throughout our diocese."

It is estimated that as many as 3,000 people, mainly women and children, could be arriving in the next few days and weeks in the areas that make up the Diocese of Monmouth. Congregations and church members will be keen to do all we can to support and help them as they seek to settle amongst us.

Bishop Cherry, says: "Our thought is to have our own fund so that we could help local churches better support refugees in their community and bring those who are quite isolated together."

“This will be available to resource our support work locally in terms of practical and pastoral care as well as funding other things such as translation services so that we can offer emotional and spiritual support where that is needed. “

“Please be as generous as you can. Ongoing support for the refugees who come here is going to be needed for many months and most likely years, and their needs are only going to increase as time goes by. Whatever you give will be used wisely and well. Thank you.”

Details of how to donate to the fund and also how to apply for funding will be available shortly. Please think of this fund when you are fundraising over Lent.



Day of prayer for Ukraine

This Sunday (April 3), churches and Christians from across the UK and Ireland are being invited to come together in an act of witness to pray and light candles for Ukraine, for an end to the conflict, and for all those affected by the terrible impact of war.

The event is being co-ordinated by the charity, Christian Aid.

Mari McNeill, head of Christian Aid Wales says, "We have all watched the unfolding conflict in Ukraine and seen the heart-breaking stories of people fleeing violence, not knowing when they'll see their loved ones again. More than two million people have fled Ukraine. Many more have been forced from their homes to seek shelter. Lives have been lost and families torn apart. Homes have been destroyed and many roads are blocked. No one is safe.

"Churches in Ukraine, in neighbouring countries and here in Wales alongside many others in the community have responded with generosity and hospitality to support and welcome refugees.

"We all share a feeling of horror and powerlessness but **every prayer, every action brings hope to the people of Ukraine**. We are sharing a prayer that we would invite you to use on 3rd April during your worship for that Sunday and if possible, perhaps in a more public event with other churches and your wider community.

"There will be an event at near the Ukrainian and Russian embassies in London in the afternoon. There will also be one or two events in Wales, with details to follow this week. Together as Christians in these islands and with our sisters and brothers in the churches of Ukraine, we pray for an end to the conflict and for peace in our world."

Follow Gerald of Wales on your smartphone



An archdeacon's journey around Wales more than 800-years-ago to recruit crusaders can now be retraced using your smartphone.

Gerald of Wales accompanied the Archbishop of Canterbury over Easter 1188 to recruit thousands of men for the third crusade. His detailed record of the journey is one of the main sources of information about Wales in the century after the Norman invasion of Britain.

Now the HistoryPoints project, with support from the Church in Wales and others, has provided QR codes for 37 places in Wales which featured in Gerald's itinerary. Anyone who scans the QR codes with a smartphone can discover what Gerald saw there in 1188, along with the place's wider history.

Each location has a page on the HistoryPoints.org website. Each has a link to the page for the next and previous places in the itinerary, making it easy to follow the route physically or virtually on home computers.

The tour is available not only in English but also Welsh and French, thanks to the work of volunteer translators, principally Catherine Jones and Professor Dai Thorne.

Among the places on the tour are churches, cathedrals and castles which existed before King Edward I's creation of castles and walled towns a century after Gerald's tour. The abbeys Gerald visited were closed centuries later but their ruins survive, as does the abbey church at Margam.



Gerald, who was Archdeacon of Brecon, failed in several attempts to become Bishop of St Davids and make the Welsh church independent from Canterbury. He died in 1223.

Dr Sarah Rowland Jones, Dean of St Davids Cathedral, says, "Gerallt Gymro, Geraldus Cambrensis, was buried in our cathedral and we are always pleased to welcome visitors who are interested to see his effigy next to that of his cousin, Yr Arglwydd Rhys (the Lord Rhys), in the cathedral south aisle. This QR-code trail will help visitors find him."

Rhodri Clark, editor of HistoryPoints.org, says, "Gerald's itinerary reflects the places in Wales which were important in the late 12th century, long before the Tudor dynasty or the Industrial Revolution. No recruitment drive for the crusade could afford to miss out Caerleon, Usk, Llanbadarn Fawr or Nefyn, for example.

"We hope that making this information available on the spot will bring Gerald's fascinating observations to a new audience."

Bishop Wyn Evans, the Church in Wales' archivist and former Bishop of St Davids, encouraged people to follow the tour. He said, "Such an enterprise reacting to one of the greatest of Welsh churchmen is greatly to be welcomed."





Cynnal Easter Prayer 2022


Heavenly Father,
