Ministry Area Team Day 2023

An inspirational afternoon was held after our Spring Conference to consider how we can develop our ministry area life.

The session began with a lively, and thought-provoking address from the Rt Revd John Lomas, Bishop of Swansea who talked about 'Moving at the Speed of God'. With personal examples of where he was out of step during his military days, to a time when he very much felt "the internal rhythm that God sets within us" his talk reminds us all of the power of being in the right place, at the right time.



He says: "How many articles have you seen in the newspapers, Church Times, or whatever else, that say by the year 2033 there will be nobody left in the Church of Wales, or the Church of England, because that is the point in decline where we hit the bottom line and that it's all over?

"It's not true, it never has been true and it never will be true, and all we have to do, I believe, as a church, is to move into that place where God acts and to hit that mark at

the right time, in the right frame of mind, with the equipment to carry out the job that He has told us to do. In the right frame of mind that we can love each other as we love ourselves and we can be a team that works together."

The session was then lead by the Ven Stella Bailey, Archdeacon of the Gwent Valleys and Director of Mission, with discussions with representatives from each of our 16 ministry areas and our cathedral.

Archdeacon Stella, said: "Bishop John offered some outstanding input into what it looks like to walk at the pace of God.

"We are at a significant point in the shaping of our ministry areas where we are setting up our processes and ethos around what it means to join God in mission together - that holds the balance between the strength of unity, and engagement with the local. "Ethos setting does not happen overnight, but requires us to think, pray and plan together so that good habits and relationships of trust are formed. "It was good to have time to listen to each other in talking about the health of our churches."

Archdeacon Stella, along with the Ven Ian Rees, Director of Ministry, are both keen to join others on their journey of development and recommend three courses that they could use as tools of support.

- PCC Tonight is a CPAS course around the role and responsibilities of our ministry area council's and how they can be places where God's mission becomes the start of our conversation.
- Leading your Church into Growth (LyCIG) is a course that helps a church set a culture that enables growth principles to be part of its DNA as people are equipped and motivated to play their part.
- Faith in our Future Planning is a process to journey with a ministry area into
 evaluating their shared life and activities and to let go of that which is potentially
 no longer fruitful, and seek new ways in reaching our communities in a
 contextual way.

A Rocha Eco Church Award

Newport Cathedral is delighted to have joined the ever growing number of churches from across the diocese which been awarded an *A Rocha Eco Church Award*. Informed by the diocesan vision, the cathedral is committed to ensuring that striving to care for the integrity of God's creation is culturally embedded in its life and witness, and hopes to be in a position later in the year to apply for a silver award. Metal Theft

Metal theft has become, as we are well aware, an escalating national crime problem. Churches in particular are popular targets for thieves, containing as they often do large amounts of metal such as lead and copper. The police advise that there have been at least 9 incidents involving theft of lead from church roofs in Gwent in the last 12 months.

Under the Heritage Watch Scheme any reports of Heritage Crime are followed up with contact from the Rural Crime Team and free Smartwater packs and deterrent signage are provided to those that wish to participate. This service by the dedicated team also serves to provide participants with a point of contact should any further issues or concerns arise.

The police are keen for the opportunity to participate in Heritage Watch to be extended to all churches not only within Gwent, but across Wales as a whole. Last Chance to Book: Chrism Mass


Our Chrism Mass this year will take place, once again, on the Tuesday of Holy Week, **4th April**, **at 11am in Newport Cathedral**.

Churches Unlocked Festival

In June last year, Llandaff Diocese ran the first 'Churches Unlocked'. This is a summer festival supporting churches in opening to visitors for things such as tours, family events, flower festivals, bell-ringing, music, concerts, family history and themed exhibitions.

In 2023 Monmouth Diocese will be taking part too with 10 churches involved.

Archdeacon lan said, 'Our church buildings represent a massive treasure but they are too often closed, other than for services or occasional other events. As we increasingly focus on being outward looking in mission, we also have an opportunity to extend an invitation for people to come and look around our buildings, and to become

inspired by the history as well as the generations that have worshipped in those buildings before us.

But it's also an opportunity to show how we our telling the Christian story today and our buildings are important tools in doing that. I have no doubt that Churches Unlocked will be a success for those taking part from Monmouth Diocese and we look forward to it growing in years to come.'







The aims of the project are:

- To **raise awareness** of our church buildings, celebrating not only their heritage but also what they offer to their local communities today
- To **encourage** churches to be open and welcoming to visitors, with a focus on those churches not usually open other than for worship
- To **engage** with those who may not attend church but have an interest in heritage/community history/architecture

Results in Llandaff were very encouraging, with over 3000 people either participating in events or visiting the 10 churches involved. Church organisers were overwhelmingly positive in their feedback describing the experience variously as 'inspiring, emotional, good for morale, celebrated local identity, community involvement and confidence building'. There were many comments about how the festival enabled connections to be made or to be re-established post-Covid with schools, local people, or former members of the congregation.

Churches Unlocked 2023 will run from Saturday 3rd - Sunday 11th June this year. More details of the churches involved and events happening will be available soon.

Count on Nature



Churches across Wales can now register to participate in Churches Count on Nature, an annual scheme where people visit churchyards and record the plant and animal species they encounter.

The biodiversity survey, supported by environmental charities A Rocha UK and Caring for God's Acre, as well as the Church in Wales and the Church of England, will take place from **June 3-11**, at the same time as Churches Unlocked.

The data is used to determine where rare and endangered species are located in the country and to aid churches of all denominations increase biodiversity on their land for the enrichment of the environment and local communities.

Churches Count on Nature is part of Love Your Burial Ground Week, which is open to anyone with a love of nature. Churches are being encouraged to connect with local schools, wildlife groups, and those who may not have visited before to discover their churchyards.

The Archbishop of Wales, Andrew John, appealed to those who look after churchyards, "to join in Churches Count on Nature during Love Your Burial Ground week in June. Invite the whole community, young and experienced, and make a day of it—it's an easy, free and fun way to show just how much we care for God's creation."
