Belonging to a 'believing community'



The time and focus we invest in our own discipleship matters beyond nurturing our own relationship with God. It is through us that others see and know the love of God. What helps people to understand Christianity is not a well written book, or a carefully crafted course, but the life and activity of the Christian community. Our church communities are theology in action. We are the lens that explains the Gospel to those that encounter us.

The theologian Leslie Newbigin says,

"I am suggesting that the only answer, the only hermeneutic (way of interpreting) of the Gospel, is a congregation of men and women who believe it and live by it. I am, of course, not denying the importance of the many activities by which we seek to challenge public life with the Gospel..., but I am saying that these are all secondary, and that they have power to accomplish their purpose only as they are rooted in and lead back to a believing community."

How we live out our faith, how we participate in God's mission as a community of believers, how we talk about the world around us, and interpret it through scripture, has an impact on the faith life of others. This is why discipleship matters. This is why we are called to develop and nurture our own relationship with God.



Post-Easter Course



We hope that ministry areas will continue to offer groups for study and discussion through the year. As you will have seen there are many options available. This is a six session course (with an option for a social session at the end). It fits in well with several branches of our vision, particularly **discipleship**, **stewardship** and the **environment**. Each of the sessions begins with an icebreaker then a short time of worship,

followed by some bible reflection and then some practical applications of our thoughts for today. It is a course that can be followed at any time of the year but as Spring moves into Summer and we begin to think more about the beauty of creation as well as the opportunity to get outside in it, this seems a really good time for thinking how we live our lives valuing creation to the full!

Discipleship in schools

Being disciples isn't something that just happens in church. It is something that must dominate our lives, something that we take into every situation we face. An important place where this is evident is in our church schools.
